On the 17<sup>th</sup> of this May month, we have an important presentation lined up titled **Mothers of Children with Disabilities: In mourning or on the march?**Our speaker is Dr Brian Watermeyer, who is a clinical psychologist and disabilities researcher based at UCT's Disability Studies Division. He has published widely on disability, psychoanalysis and clinical psychology and has taught on postgraduate programs at 3 Cape Universities. Dr Watermeyer identifies as a disabled person and has an extensive portfolio of media articles and appearances as an activist in the South African disability movement. His presentation to our group will provide background to key debates regarding the impact of disability on familial relationships.

This is a topic which evokes strong feelings as it involves theory, politics, human rights issues and strongly held beliefs about what disability is about and what disabled children and their families 'need'. Dr Watermeyer's discussion will be rooted in a critical psychoanalytic view of disability inequality, which asks questions about the nature of unconscious evocations stirred by images and notions of bodily difference which mediate social responses to disabled people. He will also discuss implications for social justice activism and clinical practice. We are really looking forward to this important conversation.
