## February Speaker

Towards the end of 2019, the Constitutional Court maintained its ruling that the "reasonable and moderate chastisement" of children as a form of physical discipline by their parents is unconstitutional. This decision caused relief amongst those who long advocated for such a law to be passed and an uproar amongst many South African parents who felt their right to discipline their children as they deem fit, were stripped away.

In our February talk, **Dr Susan Hawkrige** will describe the recent **Constitutional Court ruling on corporal punishment** and its implications, then look at the definition and epidemiology of corporal punishment, and the evidence concerning the outcomes of the practice. She will present an analysis of the arguments against and for corporal punishment, and some suggestions as to how to address the issue in the child mental health context.

Dr Susan Hawkrige is a registered child and adolescent psychiatrist. She is currently the head of child and adolescent psychiatry services at Tygerberg Hospital where she has worked in various capacities since 1993. She is a senior lecturer in the Department of Psychiatry, Stellenbosch University and a Clinical Associate in the Department of Psychology at Rhodes University. Her current service commitments include the co-ordination of child and adolescent forensic psychiatry services in the Western Cape. Her other areas of interest include early onset psychotic disorders, paediatric psychopharmacology, and community-based child mental health services.

We look forward to welcoming Dr Hawkrige as our first speaker of 2020 on **Thursday 21 February!**

# Newborn Behavioural Observation



**What is the NBO:**

The Newborn Behavioural Observation (NBO) system utilises carefully honed skills in observation of newborn regulatory, physical and social capacities to promote attuned parenting, and optimize the neurological and psychological development of infants.

Training in the NBO includes training in the careful observation of 18 newborn capacities and behavioural adaptations prominent from birth to the third month of life. It is designed to be easy to use and is a helpful tool for obstetric, midwifery, mental health, paediatric, occupational therapy, speech therapy, chiropractics, nursing and general practice professionals who work with parents during the crucial perinatal period.
