May speaker

We are very excited about the upcoming talk by **Dr. Nicola Dugmore** on **Thursday 16 May**. She will be speaking on: **The presence of a "nanny" in South African infant observations**. Many South African infants are co-reared by a 'nanny' who has been employed as a domestic worker in the infant's home. Very little research has been carried out into the impact of 'nannies' on the infant's early life and development, or on the particular triangulated relationships that develop between infant, mother and "shadow mother" in the South African context. This presentation explores aspects of these two themes illustrated by vignettes from infant observations.

Dr Nicola Dugmore is an educational psychologist offering psychotherapy in a private practice in Newlands, Cape Town. She has a PhD (Psychology) from University of the Witwatersrand and the title of her doctoral thesis was Psychoanalytic parent-infant psychotherapy in South Africa: Opening ports of entry and flexing the frame. Nicola teaches infant observation on the MPhil Infant Mental Health programme at Stellenbosch University. She has had several papers published in journals that include Infant Mental Health Journal and Journal of Child Psychotherapy.
